# Tipflation: Is tipping culture out of control?

"It's a mess," read a headline in the Washington Post.

These days the headline could have referred to almost anything. The war in Ukraine. The war in the Middle East. Our dysfunctional Congress.

But the headline was referring to a story on the American culture of tipping. The story was based on a Pew Research survey.

The survey points out that when it comes to when, where and how much to tip, confusion and consternation reign.

### The View from My Seat

And part of the consternation arises from a trend being called "tipflation."

According to the Pew study, 72 percent of us say tipping is expected in more places today than five years ago.

And, according to the survey, even as we say we are being asked to tip more often, relatively few of us have much confidence in how and when to do so.

Only 34 percent of us say it is easy to know when to tip for different services, and only 33 percent say it is easy to determine how much to pay.

"Tipflation" certainly does not rival all the other "messes" out there, but it does impact our wallets. And I must admit, it does seem increasingly hard to know how much to tip these days, even in restaurants.

While 15 percent used to be the restaurant standard, these days 20 percent is largely viewed as most acceptable. Some restaurants will automatically add a gratuity, which is often done to guarantee (See TIPFLATION on Page 6) The Bulletin Compared and the provided a

How Hall-of-Famer Ty Cobb participated in the 1926 scandal that was hush-hush

World Series 2023 had the lowest television ratings in history. There's no need to belabor the whys and wherefores. Instead of listening to the ceaseless chatter of announcer John Smoltz, fans would be better off acquainting themselves with the game's rich history.

A good start: Read Dan Taylor's "Baseball at the Abyss," which takes a deep dive into the forgotten 1926 scandal that involved Hall-of-Fame greats Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker, as the principal scoundrels.

Baseball has a long, unhappy gambling history that dates back before the 1919 Chicago Black Sox scandal. In baseball's early days, bookmakers plied their trade in the open, working the ballpark areas inside and outside, taking wagers. The 1919 World Series may have, in the words of F. Scott Fitzgerald, destroyed the faith of 50 million people, about half the U.S. population then, but throwing baseball games was commonplace. As Emil "Happy" Felsch, a White Sox fixer, said, "Playing rotten ain't that hard to do."

Author Taylor explains that the dirty deeds had their inception in 1919, when the Cleveland Indians were in Detroit to face the Tigers. Neither the Indians nor the Tigers were going to win the pennant, but the Tigers were in a tight scrum with the Yankees for third place. In the dead-ball era, a third-place finish meant a small share of the post-season loot for every Tigers' member. The Indians had second place locked up. Cobb and Speaker, the respective managers of the Tigers and Indians, huddled prior to the September 25 game to (See SCANDAL on Page 6)

### Why an earthquake switch may not be such a good idea

**Q**. News is that scientists have learned how to switch earthquakes "off" and "on." So, why not switch off the fault that might bring the Big One to San Francisco?

A. The largest recorded quake was in Chile in 1960, where a slab of rock 800 x 200 kms slipped 21 meters past the adjacent rock, magnitude 9.5, says Nigel Calder in "Magic Universe." Micro-earthquakes, with rock slippage or "creep" measured in mms, rank at magnitude 2 - undetectable by people or distant seismometers. But the little ones can grow into big ones, reasoned Hiroo Kanamori, at Tokyo University and Caltech.

Since there are 100,000 times more quakes of magnitude 2 than 7, predicting the big ones is bound to be uncertain, as when forecasters failed to warn of the deadly Kobe earthquake in Japan in 1995.

Scientists can now switch earthquakes on by using water under pressure pumped in through boreholes close to fault lines, raising the possibility of "stage-managing" a lot of small quakes to relieve the San Andreas fault strain buildup, thus saving San Francisco. Some 500 boreholes 4,000 meters deep might be needed to do this. An intriguing idea, yes, but politically explosive, says Calder. "Since every earthquake in California would be blamed on this, whether it was really responsible or not, litigation against the government would continue for centuries."

And who knows? The little ones just might backfire and trigger the dreaded Big One. Kanamori's caution: "Better not pull the tiger's tail."

# How does a relationship effect how long you live?

**Q**. "People who need people are the luckiest people in the world," the old song says. Might your doctor agree?

A. If she's up on the research, she would. While close relationships can be stressors in life, causing some of our greatest heartaches, more often they provide us with our greatest joys, contributing to our health and overall happiness, says David G. Myers in "Social Psychology."

People are good for us! In 80+ studies, social support has been linked with healthier hearts and immune systems. People in close relationships eat better, exercise more, smoke and drink less.

Moreover, in one five-year study of 423 elderly married couples, those who GAVE the most social support (running errands for friends, emotionally supporting their spouse, etc.) enjoyed the greatest longevity. On the other hand, lonely people have been shown to sleep less well, experience more stress, and fall into depressions. "With few social ties with friends, kin or other members of close-knit religious or community groups, all of us are more likely to die prematurely." Sorry, gotta go now.

### Put that cash away before a copy machine sees you

**Q**. How do photocopiers work and under what surprising conditions are they programmed NOT to work?

A. They're similar to a camera but instead of a negative image on a photosensitive film, they create a real image from a pattern of positive charges after exposure to light, says Jennifer Ouellette in "Black Bodies and Quantum Cats." A rotating drum is covered with photoconductive material; a lightbulb flashes, and the image of the original document is projected onto the drum. The positively charged dark areas not exposed to light attract the negatively charged dry ink (toner).

An unforeseen consequence of excellent color copiers - xerographic counterfeit currencies! So, since 1993, Xerox has made photocopiers with built-in software able to detect when currency is being copied. One model automatically colors the entire page cyan blue, i.e., the copy's useless. "Another has a blue screen come up on the user interface, warning that reproduction of currency is forbidden, and the copier automatically shuts down."

Then I bought a micro-cassette , because it was smaller and less conspicuous. Those little tapes were so cute, but they didn't last long. I had to do the interviews fast or change cassettes in mid-process. That's where I stopped with tape recorders; they're all somewhere in a closet.

But recently, I realized that it would be really convenient to just tape a speech I was interested in at a recent Angleton Chamber of Commerce luncheon.

I started looking in local stores, but I didn't find a good selection. They were too big and too expensive. I didn't want to spend that much on a recorder I was not going to use that often.

iron out the details

Speaker assured Cobb that he "wouldn't have to worry" about the game's outcome. The Cleveland team preferred. Speaker insisted, that Detroit finish in third. By virtue of that finish, the Tigers were likely to make about \$500 for each player. Cobb, Speaker, Tigers pitcher Dutch Leonard and Indians pitcher Smoky Joe Wood all agreed to conspire in the fix.

Years later, Leonard confessed the four had agreed that since their post-season share would be small, they might as well wager on the game.

The Tigers won the game 9-5, plating four runs in the first two innings. The

Indians committed three costly errors, and Cleveland starter Elmer Myers – perhaps tipped off to the fix or maybe acting on his own whimsy - floated pitches to the plate for the Detroit batters. Speaker banged out three hits, all of them well after the Tigers had control of the game and the outcome was clear.

No one is certain whether Cobb, Speaker or anyone else actually received money from their bets. The scant remaining evidence indicates that the wrongdoers may not have been able to place all the bets they hoped to.

That winter, Cobb, Speaker, Wood and Leonard went home, but the four men exchanged letters about the incident, sharing their regret that they were unable to get their bets down in time and that their shared proposition fizzled. The letters came back to haunt the four.

Several years later, the stench from the fixing incident wafted out. A vengeful Leonard wanted to settle a score with his former teammate, Cobb, now the Tigers manager. Once, Cobb kept Leonard in a 1925 game in which the southpaw surrendered 20 runs, and the manager mocked the idea that he vank his humiliated starter. Leonard never forgot, and the memory ate at him.

Cobb released Leonard, and insiders said Ty discouraged other American League teams from signing the lefty. Dutch stewed, and in May 1926, he presented the letters he received from Cobb, Speaker and Wood - the evidence - to Tigers owner Frank Navin, who turned them over to American League President Ban Johnson. To keep a lid on the percolating scandal, Johnson paid Leonard \$20,000 to go back to Fresno, where he owned a farm, and focus on his raisin growing. At the season's end, Johnson forced Cobb and Speaker to resign.

Eventually, the superstars appealed their cases to Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis who, sensing that the public and the baseball writers were solidly behind the diamond, absolved Speaker and Cobb, facts be damned.

Landis read the room correctly. Baseball bugs were fed up with scandal. At least five World Series - 1905, 1912, 1914, 1918 and 1919 - were rumored to have been influenced by game-fixers. And the 1923 Teapot Dome Scandal that implicated President Warren G. Harding - considered the greatest presidential scandal until Watergate - was still reverberating among the citizenry.

Cobb and Speaker played until 1928. Speaker for one year with the Washington Senators and one year with the Philadelphia A's, and Cobb two years with the A's.

Better to remember Cobb as one of baseball's all-time greats, .366 career batting average with nine consecutive titles, and Speaker, the "Gray Eagle", who holds outfielder records for assists, double plays and unassisted double plays. Balls hit to center field where Speaker patrolled were considered the place where triples go to die.

Cobb, Speaker, Wood and Leonard got off the hook, and played into their 40s. Pete Rose, however, who holds MLB career records for 4,256 career hits, 3,215 career singles, 3,562 career games played, 14,053 career at-bats and 15,890 career plate appearances, was permanently banned for his gambling infractions.

In life, good timing is invaluable.

spilled over into other businesses. In those cases, it is called "a mandatory service fee," but it really is a forced tip.

How did "tipflation" happen? Sara Bregel, in an article at fastcompany.com, says the pandemic is partly to blame.

Because of Covid, it became commonplace to tip delivery drivers and others who kept the country going.

And restaurants that shifted from sit-down to takeout were being strained. So, we started tipping when we picked up a burger and fries. That had never been standard practice, but it became one.

Technology also has contributed to "tipflation." Digital payment technology has made it easy to add an option for tipping. We can pretty much tip anywhere we go.

Besides "tipflation," the Pew Survey of 12.000 adults also found:

- More Americans (40 percent) oppose than favor (24 percent) businesses suggesting tip amounts to customers.

- Americans broadly oppose (72 percent) businesses including automatic service charges or - tips on customer bills.



### You're never too young or old to learn more about cooking

Have you washed a banana today?

I've been busy on the Internet looking at all the cooking sites and have read about a lot of things I do routinely that seem to be against all the common sense and disease prevention advice.

If you eat bananas, watermelon, cantaloupe, or any other fruit or vegetable that requires peeling, it is advised that you wash it before peeling it. It seems you could contaminate the food by touching the exterior and then peeling it.

Those dratted dirty hands are the culprit. Washing bananas is doable, but the watermelon, if its like the large ones I buy during the summer, are more of a challenge. They are too large for my double kitchen sink. It's either the bathtub or outside and the water hose. But wait there's more.

It seems that butter can only be kept at room temperature for three to four days. I keep mine on the kitchen counter for up to three weeks before it is all used. I use unsalted butter, and the claim is salted butter will last a few days longer, but I'm not adding an unknown amount of salt to any of my recipes. Where do you store your prepared mustard?

I keep my mustard in the refrigerator. The cooking gurus said that is a "no, no." They spoke of altered taste and absorbing odor from the refrigerator's contents. I don't keep my mustard in a bowl but rather in their original container and to date haven't noticed any ill effects on the product as a matter of fact it says on the container to "keep refrigerated after opening." I will trust the maker of the mustard.

Leftovers are another bone of contention. The educated chefs and authors of the food websites advise keeping leftovers for three to four days. I routinely keep for seven to ten days, and I have survived! I at least assume, since I'm still here as I sit at the computer keyboard.

I routinely cook one to two pounds of pinto beans or make six to eight quarts of chili at a time all for a family of one. If I don't share with friends and family, I find myself eating leftovers frequently and for sometime longer than ten days.

I'm not totally incompetent. I can freeze chili in individual serving sizes and freeze for the next cold snap. I haven't tried to freeze beans yet, but I don't see why I couldn't; further investigation is required.

I have never been forced to discard leftovers, as I have enough family to prevent that from happening. The only meals I can restrict quantities on are the occasional steak and Sunday morning breakfast.

For Sunday morning breakfast, I have one egg (over easy) and four pieces of bacon, two or three pieces of toast, and jelly. Don't panic! I only have two pieces of bacon, but I cut my bacon in half when I buy it and convince myself I am truly being decadent and having four pieces of bacon, when in reality, it's only two. Of course, there is a pot of coffee to accompany that breakfast.

The truth is I enjoy cooking, especially now that I can when I really want to as being opposed to, I really need to. I cooked for my two children and myself for several years. I had some quick dishes that could cook while I checked homework or do other things. Chicken, rice, and cream of chicken and mushroom soup was a frequent quick supper. My daughter now has an aversion to cream of mushroom soup. Bless her heart.

### Did you know about Eratosthenes?

Eratosthenes, the Greek philosopher, was the first known person to calculate the circumference of the Earth. He died at 82 by voluntarily starving himself to death because he was going blind.

Eratosthenes sent a man to Syene from Alexandria on foot to measure the distance between Alexandria and Syene. Thus, Eratosthenes measured the distance between the two cities is 800 km. He multiplied by 800 km to 50 and calculated that the Earth's circumference is 40,000 km.

Eratosthenes was one of those ancient Greeks who changed the world. He was a polymath, someone with expert knowledge of a range of topics - a mathematician, geographer, astronomer, philosopher, poet, and music theorist.

From the time he was five years old and all but abandoned by his parents, John Lennon lived with his aunt and uncle, Mimi and George Smith, in Woolton, England.

One of his favorite spots to explore with his childhood friends was the garden of the nearby Salvation Army orphanage, which was known as Strawberry Fields.

The Beatles recorded most of their debut album in one day.

No four people on Earth were more productive on Feb. 11, 1963, than The Beatles. On that momentous day, the lads from Liverpool recorded 10 songs that would appear on their debut album, "Please Please Me." At the very end of the 12-hour session, they tackled "Twist and Shout," a raucous number that required an alreadyhoarse John Lennon to completely shred what remained of his voice.

Richard Starkey (Ringo Starr), called "Ritchie" by his doting mother, was born in Liverpool in 1940.

He began playing the drums in a hospital band at the age of 13 while recuperating from a bout of tuberculosis, and by 17, he had helped to found the Eddie Clayton Skiffle Band.

He joined the Beatles in 1962, replacing their first drummer, Pete Best.



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
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

### Will Armageddon bring escape or suffering?

From the writings of the Rev. Billy Graham


**Q**: Is it true that the word Armageddon means "battle between good and evil"? I fear that Christians will have to go through this awful time when the world comes to an end, but I fear most for those who go through it not knowing God in a personal way. It doesn't seem that the book of Revelation is clear on the state of the church at that time. – A.F.

A: There's a cataclysmic time coming known as the Battle of Armageddon, where good and evil collide. The Bible is clear about what mankind should do to make itself ready for the end times: "Prepare to meet thy God" (Amos 4:12, KJV). Most important is not to wait until the end to prepare, but settle the matter of the soul today, while there is time. As the world moves relentlessly toward a period of intense tribulation, seek Him in all things - now!

Whether Christians will face the period of tribulation around Armageddon is a matter of debate among equally sincere Bible scholars. But there can be no doubt that suffering in one form or another comes to us all. And we can be certain that God will give us the strength and resources we need to live through any situation in life that He ordains. The will of God will never take us where the grace of God cannot sustain us.

The Bible and the history of the church both demonstrate that God's way for the suffering of His people has not always been the way of escape, but the way of endurance. We must learn to live triumphantly amid the traumas and pressures we face daily and, in doing so, be a light in the present darkness that covers the world, so that others will hear the Gospel and prayerfully humble themselves before God and obey Him.
