WEATHER HISTORY •ON THIS DAY•

Oct. 22, 1985 - A guest on the top floor of a hotel in Seattle, WA., was seriously injured while talking on the phone when lightning struck. Several persons are killed each year when the electrical charge from a lightning bolt travels via telephone wiring.

Oct. 24, 2005 - Hurricane Wilma reached the U.S. coastline near Everglades City in Florida with maximum sustained winds near 120 mph. The hurricane accelerated across south Florida and the Miami/Fort Lauderdale area, exiting the coast later the same day. There were 10 fatalities in Florida, and nearly 6 million people lost power.

Oct. 26, 1987 - Five cities in south central Texas reported record-high temperatures for the date, including Corpus Christi and Del Rio, with readings of 93 degrees. Laredo, TX. was the hot spot in the nation with a high of 98 degrees.

Oct. 27, 1962 - An early season winter storm over New England blanketed northern Maine with 7 to 16 inches of snow and southeastern New England with up to 3 inches of snow. Worcester, MA, received a record 4.7 inches of snow.

Oct. 28, 1936 - The temperature at Lavton, N.J., dipped to 9 above zero to establish a state record for the month of October.



Strange but True

Q. From a Charlottesville, VA., editor: "Why is the letter 'W' called a double-U instead of a double-V? It sure looks like a double-V. Who mixed up these two letters in the first place?"

A. Norman scribes in the 11th century introduced the "w" to replace the runic symbol "wynn" from Old English, says David Crystal in "The Cambridge Encyclopedia of the English Language." It got the name "double-U" because in Middle English "v" and "u" were interchangeable forms, with scribes writing "uu" for the /w/ sound. This old double-identity is still evident in cognate pairs such as flour/ flower and suede/Swede (from askoxford.com).

Oddly, the "w" is the only English letter name with more than one syllable, says Wikipedia.org, giving the Web's ubiquitous nine-syllable initialism "www" the irony of being an abbreviation with three times as many syllables as the unabbreviated form World Wide Web.

Q. Don't even think about trying to top this one, but

what's the record for skid marks on a public road?

A. Set in 1960 by a Jaguar driver on England's M1 highway, the marks were 290 meters (950 ft) long, says Jearl Walker in "The Flying Circus of Physics." In court, the speed at wheellock was alleged to be 160 kilometers per hour (100 mph), though later calculations put it at more like 225 kph (140 mph).

Yet these skid marks pale next to those left by Craig Breedlove in October 1964 at Utah's Bonneville Salt Flats, who drove his rocket-powered "Spirit of America" through a measured mile at about 540 mph. To slow, he released a parachute, but its cord snapped: his second chute also failed. His brakes did little more than leave 6-mile-long skid marks before burning out.

Still traveling at 500 mph, the vehicle rode up and over an embankment and plummeted nose down at 160 mph into a pool of brine five meters deep.

Firmly strapped into his seat, Breedlove nearly drowned. He had broken the 500-mile-perhour barrier with an average speed of 526 mph, inadvertently setting the skid-mark record also.

Q. Over the centuries. prisoners condemned to be hanged by the neck have had plenty to worry about. Have the hangmen/executioners had anything to worry about?

A. Old-fashioned "shortdrop" executions caused death by strangulation as the rope pressed on the windpipe and arteries to the brain, a 10-second demise, says "New Scientist" magazine. Alas, that was only if the noose was correctly applied.

Witnesses of public hangings often reported victims "dancing" in pain at the end of the rope, struggling violently for many minutes as they asphyxiated to death. In some cases, strugglers were cut down and resuscitated. even after 15 minutes!

When public hangings were outlawed in Britain in 1868, the "long-drop" method took over with a lengthy rope to build up greater speed to assure a more "merciful" breaking of the neck. The length had to be tailored to the victim's weight, as too great a force "could rip the head clean" off, a professionally embarrassing outcome for the hangman."

Yet, an analysis as late as 1992 of the remains of 34 prison-

ers found that only in about half of cases was the cause of death at least partially spinal trauma, with a fifth showing the classic "hangman's fracture." The rest died in part from asphyxiation.

But, adds Canadian anthropologist Michael Spence, who studied U.S. victims, the trauma of the drop would have rapidly rendered all of them unconscious anyway. "What the hangmen were looking for was quick cessation of activity, and they knew enough about their craft to ensure that happened. The thing they feared most was decapitation."

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On Nutrition: When diabetes is diagnosed during pregnancy

It's not an easy diagnosis to hear when you're pregnant. With less than 12 weeks to go in her pregnancy, a woman I know shared that a test had revealed she has gestational diabetes - diabetes that is diagnosed during pregnancy.

I tried to comfort this mom with a few facts. Yes, it's scary, but gestational diabetes (GDM) is very controllable.

This condition affects up to 9% of pregnancies in the U.S. each year, according to the American Diabetes Association. And it is largely due to changes in a mom's hormones during the last stages of pregnancy. That's why tests to determine this condition are usually done between weeks

24 and 28 of pregnancy.

Some women are at higher risk, however. Being overweight, having a family history of type 2 diabetes or having given birth to a baby weighing over 9 pounds increases one's chances to develop GDM. Moms over the age of 35 and those of African American, Hispanic or Latino, Native American or Pacific Islander descent also carry a higher risk.

The most important goal for a successful pregnancy with this condition is to keep blood sugars in a normal range. That means blood glucose levels must be checked often while following a careful diet and being as active as the pregnant state allows.

In general, most women

will need to eat smaller, more frequent meals and limit the amount of sugars and starches (carbohydrates) they eat at any one time.

Pregnant moms with this condition also need to load up on nutrient-rich, non-starchy veggies, such as asparagus, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, carrots, lettuce and leafy greens, green beans, peppers, tomatoes, yellow squash and zucchini.

Protein at each meal is especially important for baby building. That includes foods such as chicken, turkey, eggs, fish, lean beef, pork, cheese, tofu and peanut butter, dried beans and lentils. (Watch the serving size of these last two as they also contain carbs.)

World's first antibiotic discovered by accident

In September 1928, Sir Alexander Fleming returned to his London laboratory after a

vacation and noticed that a mold had contaminated a petri dish of Staphylococcus bacteria. The bacteria colonies around the mold were dying. He identified the mold as Penicillium notatum and named the active antibacterial agent "penicillin."

While Fleming published his findings in 1929, he had trouble isolating and purifying enough of the substance to conduct further research. His initial discovery was largely overlooked by the scientific community.

A decade later, at the University of Oxford, a team of scientists led by pathologist Howard Florey and biochemist Ernst Chain became interested in Fleming's findings. The team, which also included Norman Heatley, successfully purified and concentrated penicillin in 1940

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Port welcomes two new Super Post-Panamax cranes

Port Freeport marked a historic milestone recently with the delivery of two state-of-the-art Super Post-Panamax Shipto-Shore Gantry Cranes, their arrival coinciding with the Port's 100th anniversary.

Transported fully erected aboard a heavy-lift vessel, the cranes were carefully offloaded and secured to the docks. Following installation and testing this fall, the new equipment will be placed in service, dramatically expanding the Port's capacity to service some of the world's largest container vessels efficiently.

"These cranes are a major investment in the future of Port Freeport and our community," said Rob Giesecke, Chairman of the Port Freeport Commission. "They will act as a catalyst for future growth, helping us attract new business, create more jobs, and increase operating revenues to keep Port Freeport at zero-tax."

Towering more than 300-feethigh and weighing over 1,600 tons each, the cranes feature the ability to reach across 22 containers wide with a lift above the dock of 178 feet. Outfitted

with advanced technology, they are designed to handle cargo with greater safety and efficiency, representing one of the most significant equipment upgrades in Port Freeport's history.

"The addition of the new Super Post-Panamax cranes at the expanded container terminal berths, combined with the substantial completion of the Freeport Harbor Channel Improvement Project by year's end, is a defining moment for the Port and a great way to start the Port's next century." said Phyllis Saathoff, Executive Director/CEO of Port Freeport.

"As we commemorate our Centennial, this achievement underscores our unwavering commitment to developing world-class infrastructure that will benefit our region for many years to come."

The cranes are expected to be fully operational later this fall. Their delivery during Port Freeport's Centennial year reflects both the strength of its legacy and the promise of continued opportunity. A commemorative video will be released and made available on the Port's website, allowing the community to share in their remarkable journey from delivery to installation.

Brazoria County Library System updating behind-the-scenes software

All Brazoria County libraries are preparing to transition to a new catalog system.

This software enables our staff to manage and check materials in and out, as well as for patrons to place holds. This switch will streamline and improve the overall library experience online and in-person.

This change in the catalog system will cause a temporary interruption to holds requests and Interlibrary Loan (ILL) services, starting Oct. 20. Holds or ILL requests made prior to Oct. 20 will still be fulfilled.

Patrons will be able to resume placing hold requests when the new system launches in mid-December.

Patrons can prepare for the change by doing the following:

- Making sure you have a physical library card
- Verifying information on your account is correct and up-to-date
- Renewing your library card if it is close to expiration

Beginning Nov. 10, the option to sign-up for a library card online on the library's website will be temporarily suspended.

Patrons will have to register for a card in person at one of the 12 branch libraries in the county.

Due dates for items checked out will be adjusted to account for the migration.

Library of Things items and Interlibrary Loans will still need to be returned on their original due dates.

Starting Nov. 24, all patrons will need their physical library card to check out materials.

From Nov. 24 through Dec. 15, the following will be unavailable to patrons:

- Self-checkout machines will be down.
- Patrons will not be able to check their account online.

will be sent out.

Stellantis to invest \$13B into U.S. vehicle production

Stellantis NV plans to pump \$13 billion into its U.S. operations over the next four years in what the transatlantic automaker says is the largest investment in its history.

The investment supports the introduction of five new vehicles, an all-new four-cylinder engine and more than 5,000 jobs at its facilities in Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana. The infusion appears to include many of the around \$5 billion in investments Stellantis already detailed shortly after President Donald Trump took office in January.

The changes will increase Stellantis' annual vehicle production in the United States by half, according to the automaker.

The Belvidere Assembly Plant in Illinois will make the Jeep Cherokee and Jeep Compass; the automaker previously said it planned to reopen the shuttered plant to

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make a midsize truck. Belvidere's investment is more than \$600 million.

That midsize Ram truck will now be built at the Toledo Assembly Complex in Ohio, which will get an infusion of \$400 million. It joins the Jeep Wrangler and Jeep Gladiator, which are already built there.

And at Michigan's Warren Truck Assembly Plant, which underwent significant layoffs last year, the automaker said a new range-extended EV and gas-powered large SUV will be introduced beginning in 2028. About \$100 million will be spent on retooling that facility.

The company will also pump \$130 million into the Detroit Assembly Complex-Jefferson, where it will build the next-generation Dodge Durango.

Stellantis also said it planned continued investments at its Kokomo, Indiana, facilities to make an all-new four-cylinder engine starting in 2026.

What was the first Internet message?

The first internet message was the letters "lo," sent on October 29, 1969, from UCLA to the Stanford Research Institute over ARPANET, the precursor to the modern internet. The sender, Charley Kline, was attempting to type "login," but the system crashed after the first two letters were transmitted. This transmission was the first successful host-to-host connection, marking the birth of the ARPANET and, by extension, the internet. The full "login" was successfully sent about an hour later.



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My first Halloween in a new country was a little confusing

Why are all these kids asking strangers for candy?

It was Oct. 31, 1967. I was 11 years old and landed in a strange new world just 15 days earlier. It was about to get a little stranger.

My mother and I were walking down the street after shopping, and all these kids in costumes ran around us, asking for candy.

"What are they doing?" she asked me. I had no clue. It was

only my first week in a brand new school,

in a country with a brand new language and customs.

We landed in the USA a couple of weeks earlier, flew here from Vienna, Austria.

I spent a year and a half getting accustomed to my situation there, which was a lot different than Hungary, where I was born.

I knew Hungarian and was fluent in German, but did not speak English. The task of learning it had just begun. This was my second go-around, but it still felt strange - again.

I sat in the classroom all day

long, trying to make sense of my new school. Math was familiar, but all the other stuff was French to me (or any other language I did not know).

I was making out a few words here and there, because I already knew German, and the two languages have many similar words and expressions, but I could not string together sentences. In other words. I had no clue what anyone was talking

about.

These things take time. Know-

ing Hungarian was no help at all. No words matched - not even close.

I was just beginning to climb another language barrier, and Halloween got lost somewhere in the translation.

"It's Halloween," said a friend we met on the way, who had lived here for a few years. "They're trick-or-treating. They're having fun."

The friend handed the kids a nickel each after she ran out of candv.

"Johnny will be doing it next

year," she told my mother.

Not really. I never went trick or treating as a kid. I became Americanized very quickly in all other ways, but I never warmed up to trick-or-treating.

I could buy all the candy I wanted in those fancy, bright supermarkets around us. A&P not only seemed like a food amusement park to me, but I could also buy stuff with their green stamps.

I had to file all these nuances away quickly because this was probably the last time we would country-hop. As it turned out, it

I told her how I found out about Halloween, that it looked like a lot of fun. "Maybe I'll try trick or treating next year," I said.

"I never go. My brother likes it, but I always stay at home," she said.

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On Halloween 1968, I was having a great time playing board games at Susan's home while our parents talked about the old country. Then Susan's brother came home with his stash, and we stuffed ourselves with candy.

Have a safe and enjoyable Halloween, dear reader, in any way you choose.

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
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



18th - Real Estate as a Percentage of GSP

48th - Access to National Parks 19th - % of Families Receiving SNAP (Food Stamps)

The top 10 most affected states are: District of Columbia, Hawaii, New Mexico, Alaska, Marvland, Virginia, West Virginia, Alabama, Oklahoma and Arizona.

Unsurprisingly, the District of Columbia is the part of the U.S. most affected by the shutdown, given that it's the seat of our government and the place responsible for the lapse in funding itself.

Hawaii ranks number two in terms of shutdown impact, in large part due to the big portion of federal workers in Hawaii, as around 5.6% of all jobs are federal positions.
