# WEATHER HISTORY •ON THIS DAY•

Clute, Texas 77531

Sept. 3, 1961 - Denver, CO., received 4.2 inches of snow, their earliest snow of record.

Sept. 4, 1970 - The greatest natural disaster of record for Arizona occurred. Unprecedented rains caused rivers in central Arizona to rise five to 10 feet per hour, sweeping cars and buildings as far as 30 to 40 miles downstream. Flooding claimed the lives of 23 people.

**Sept. 5, 1950** - Hurricane Easy produced the greatest 24 hour rainfall in U.S. weather records. The hurricane deluged Yankeetown, on the upper west coast of Florida, with 38.7 inches of rain.

Sept. 6, 1881 - Forest fires in Michigan and Ontario resulted in 'Yellow Dav' in the northeastern U.S. Twenty villages in Michigan burned, and a total of 500 people were killed. Candles were needed at the noon hour.

Sept. 7, 1970 - A lightning bolt struck a group of football players at Gibbs High School in Saint Petersburg FL, killing two people and injuring 22 others.

Sept. 8, 1900 - The greatest weather disaster in U.S. records occurred when a hurricane struck Galveston, TX, A tide 15 feet high washed over the island . demolishing or carrying away buildings, drowning more than 6000 persons and destroying 3.600 houses.

# Real and faked probabilities

Q. Math teacher asks half her class to flip a coin 100 times, the other half to just imagine doing so. Both record their H-T outcomes. Then, she collects the unsigned papers and tries to distinguish the real flippers from the fakers. Any chance she could really do this?

A. In "The Canon: A Whirligig Tour of the Beautiful Basics of Science." Natalie Angier reports on an elementary statistics prof who starts each semester in iust this way. And the prof is almost always right in how she calls them, leaving the students aghast. The reason she can tell is that true randomness is more haphazard than most people think. Real coin tossing will generally include more strings than people are comfortable with, such as streaks of five heads in a row or seven tails in a row.

True, 50-50 rules over the long haul, but not in the short run, and it's the short run where the surprises lie. When Angier tried the experiment herself a dozen times (12 100-flip trials), she

always got at least one streak of 6 or 7 heads or tails, often more than one 6 per set, plus many 5's and 4's. Once, she even got 9 in a row, which she felt queasy about, including in a display of faux flipping.

Moral: "The more one knows about probabilities, the less amazing the most woo-woo coincidences become."

#### Hot little bees

Q. The giant hornet "Vespa mandarinia japonica" invades a hive of Japanese bees upon which it preys, but they will have none of it. Within 20 minutes, the hornet is dead, even though the bees didn't sting, bite, crush or suffocate it. So what is their surprising weapon?

**A.** Body heat. Hundreds of the hive defenders form a huge compact bee ball around the invader and raise their body temperatures from a normal 35C to 48C, say David Halliday et al. in "Fundamentals of Physics." This higher temperature is lethal to the hornet but not harmful to the "hot-tempered" bees.

# Deflated, inflated taxi fare cheating

Q. A taxi company has as its

policy to run its cabs with older, well-worn tires and to underinflate them to boot. Penny-pinching economics, or a pinch of chicanery?

A. It's well known that older, worn tires have smaller radii (from maybe 30 centimeters down about 2%) and so turn around more times per kilometer or mile, causing the pre-calibrated odometers to over register and to inflate charges to customers, savs Goran Grimvall in "Brainteaser Physics." Underinflated tires will do the same. But the (short-term) winner in this category was the cab driver, who reportedly put on smaller-than-customary wheels so as to fatten fares, especially to longer-distance riders. He was later fined for doing so.

# **Preposition tangles**


Q. Can you recount Winston Churchill's classic line poking fun at critics of phrases like "something not to be sneezed at," "having a lot to answer for," "advice not worth arguing about," "letting everyone know where you're coming from," "laughing one's head off."

**A.** Are you in dread of ending a sentence with a preposition because somebody told you it's not grammatically correct? Well, fear no more, says Mark Davidson in "Right, Wrong, and Risky."

One dictionary calls this "a cherished superstition," another "an entrenched myth." The silly rule got started in the 17th century and was subsequently circulated by tyrannical scholars and grammarians. Sir Winston Churchill is said to have become so annoyed by terminal prepositional overzeal that he scribbled a memo to one of his correcting secretaries: "This is the type of arrant pedantry up with which I will not put."

So, anyone who tells you not to "laugh your head off" but rather to "laugh off your head" may have "a lot to answer for."

# Foods with more protein than eggs

With about 6 grams of protein apiece, eggs are an excellent source of this vital nutrient. But lots of other foods offer as much or more. For example, **CHICKPEAS** (also known as garbanzo beans) provide nearly 8 grams of protein per 1/2 cup. People have enjoyed them since the days of ancient Egypt. They're best known these days as the base for hummus. Toss a handful on a salad, or cook them into a hearty soup.

**COTTAGE CHEESE:** This nutritious source of protein, with nearly 12 grams in a half cup, plays well with others. That's because it doesn't have a strong flavor on its own. Make a healthy snack by pairing cottage cheese with most any kind of fruit. Or use it as a protein-boosting secret ingredient in pancakes. Go with low-fat cottage cheese to keep it healthy.





**CHEDDAR CHEESE:** This zingy cheese is loaded with protein -- about 7 grams per ounce, as well as other nutrients like calcium, zinc, phosphorus, and vitamins A and B-12. But keep your portions small or choose a lower-fat version. The fats found in dairy foods aren't the heart-healthy type. Cheese can be high in salt, too.

**SHRIMP:** You only need about 4 ounces of these shellfish to get more than 17 grams of protein. They're also low in calories and fat. But step away from the breaded, deep-fried variety. Instead, toss grilled shrimp into pasta with marinara sauce for a fast, protein-rich meal.

# We make the 'no-elevator challenge' on cruises to counter-balance all the food on the ship

Each time Sharon and I go cruising, we take the "no-elevator challenge."

We pledge not to take the elevator to any deck, no matter how far we have to climb. That's one reason we like to book a

cabin somewhere in the middle of the

ship, not too far from the top or the bottom.

When we first started cruising, Sharon wanted to stay in a sea-view cabin, which has a porthole, but no balcony. The porthole is actually pretty large. On the Carnival Breeze, I could fit in it and waste time away by watching the waves below us. These cabins on the Breeze were on Deck 1. We weren't at water level, but we were pretty close to it.

Making it up to the pool deck (from the very bottom to the very top) was challenging. After we decided to book balcony cabins, we left it up to the cruise ship to pick one in the category we wanted. This was cheaper than selecting a cabin ourselves.

We never had bad luck with this method. On the Carnival Vista, we were assigned a corner cabin on the Lido Deck, which is the hub of activity, featuring pools, hot tubs, waterslides and casual dining options, like the Lido Marketplace buffet.

We walked out of our cabin,

and everything was right there.
The only prob-

lem was that the Lido Deck was on Deck 10, a long way from Deck 3, where the Main Dining Room was. Going down wasn't a problem; climbing back up after dinner was a challenge.

We did the best we could to live up to our promise, but I have to admit that we did cheat on several occasions on that cruise.

On our last cruise on Carnival Dream, we fared better. Through a travel agent, we selected a room on Deck 6, which was only a few flights of stairs above the dining room and the same distance below the Lido Deck.

I'm happy to report that we only broke the promise twice, and the reasons were actually valid. Both times, I just wanted to ride in a glass elevator and video as it ascended high above the main lobby on Deck 3.

I'm still a sucker for stuff like that. I remain amazed as to how they can build a big metal ship that sails through oceans, and inside it are all these elevators that span 14 or more decks. My favorite part is riding up in the glass elevator as it reaches the Lido Deck. It goes from the organized world of a hotel lobby to beach mayhem.

A couple of days of the no-elevator challenge, climbing up and down the stairs got easier. We huffed and puffed less climbing up. Going down was not really a problem. It felt almost like cheating.

The stairs challenge also helped counteract all the food consumption that goes along with cruising. It's a good way to shake off some of those extra calories (a lot of calories).

When we pulled into Nassau, the first place I wanted to see was the Queen's Staircase. It was carved out of solid limestone by 600 slaves between 1793 and 1794.

When we arrived, we looked up the 66 steps to the top and said: "Hold my Coke Zero."

Nothing to it. Nassau was the last stop. By that time, we had been climbing up and down ship stairs for six days.

Between the challenge, getting on the treadmill in the ship's gym and walking a lot during our self-guided excursions, we felt like we were in great shape by the end of the cruise. The problem then was to keep up this level of physical activity after we came home.

We're still working on solving this problem.

Seniors are disproportionately targeted by fraudsters due to a combination of factors, including accumulated wealth, trusting nature, and potential cognitive vulnerabilities, according to the FBI and the National Council on Aging (NCOA). These scams can have devastating financial and emotional consequences.

- Government impersonation scams: Scammers pose as representatives from agencies like the IRS, Social Security Administration, or Medicare, demanding immediate payment for supposed taxes or penalties, often under threat of arrest or legal action.
- Tech support scams: Fraudsters claim to be from well-known technology companies and offer to "fix" non-existent computer problems, often gaining remote access to devices and stealing personal information, according to the FBI.
- Grandparent scams: Scammers impersonate a grandchild or other loved one in distress, claiming to need money urgently for emergencies like bail, medical bills, or travel expenses.
- Sweepstakes/lottery scams: Victims are told they've won a large sum of money or a prize but need to pay "fees" or "taxes" upfront to claim their winnings.
- Romance scams: Scammers develop fake online relationships with seniors to gain their trust and then request money for supposed emergencies or travel expenses.
- **Home repair scams:** Fraudulent contractors demand upfront payments for repairs that are never completed or poorly done.
- **Investment scams:** Scammers promote fake investment opportunities promising high returns with little to no risk, often using cryptocurrency or other complex financial products.
- Telemarketing scams: Scammers use pre-recorded calls or live conversations to pressure seniors into buying products, donating to fake charities, or signing up for unwanted services.



Our primary care doctor announced he is joining a concierge practice and invited us to follow him.

We were excited, thinking this meant luxurious fluffy white robes in the exam room and 500-thread-count cotton sheets on the table instead of that crinkly deli wrap paper.

Visions of coffee bars danced in our heads. The concierge practice could keep our specialty coffee orders on file, along with our cholesterol counts and lists a do of prescription meds.

I ventured there would probably be a masseuse and spa, too. "Where there's a spa, there's a shower," I said.

"YES!" the husband shouted.

"Free little soaps, shampoos and conditioners!"

We wondered if a concierge practice also included valet parking. If there was valet parking, there probably would be fitness-focused excursions - maybe even free membership to a pickleball court.

We were living the dream - until the dream crashed.

After further reading, several voicemail messages and a slick mailing with a QR code for a video, we learned a consistence practice is where

cierge practice is where a doctor limits the patient load, guarantees a call back within 24 hours and focuses on preventive care, not just treating illnesses.

In exchange for an annual fee. Annual means you pay it every year. Several thousand dollars. Per warm body.

There's a shortage of primary care doctors, and it is projected to worsen. More and more people are paying annual fees to see a doctor. Luxury concierge practices (the ones that do have fluffy towels and coffee bars) charge as much as \$50,000.

Our doctor was charging nowhere near that. But still.

If the husband lives as long as his dad did - until almost 98 - his concierge fees alone could equal the price of a nice new car. Adjusted for inflation, it could even be two new cars and a boat.

We love our doctor. His changing practices rips my heart out. (I'll need a cardiologist for that.) We were some of his first patients when he began practicing. He gave us his home phone number in case we needed to reach him in an emergency.

We understand why he's switching to a different practice. We'll miss him.

Our main concern in choosing a new health professional is age. That's right, we discriminate and are up front about it. We want doctors who will outlive us.

We both made appointments with a new fella. Mine was yesterday. I couldn't tell his age from the picture online and was eager to see how old he looked.

He swung open the door, said, "Hello" and extended his hand. I instinctively cried, "You're young! You're about the age of our son. He's 43."

He smiled and said, "I'm 41."
I think we're gonna like him.

# Researchers discover immune system's 'fountain of youth'

ROCHESTER, Minn. — The immune system is meant to protect the body from infection and disease, but with age, it can become less capable of doing so. However, Mayo Clinic researchers have found that some older people maintain "immune youth" – a new term coined by Mayo researchers to explain a young immune system in someone over age 60.

"We are studying why some individuals have a 'fountain of youth' in their immune systems. We want to learn from them."

says Cornelia Weyand, M.D., Ph.D., a Mayo Clinic rheumatologist and clinician-scientist. She is a lead author on a perspective paper published in "Nature Aging".

Dr. Weyand's research team discovered this cellular fountain of youth in more than 100 older patients who came to Mayo Clinic to receive treatment for an autoimmune disease that affects the arteries, including the aorta, called giant cell arteritis. Dr. Weyand and colleagues found in the diseased tissue of these patients specialized immune

These immune cells behave like young stem cells that usually regenerate and aid healing and growth; but in this case, they were spreading the disease. This team of researchers also discovered autoimmune stem cells in humans previously.

"We observed that these patients have very young immune systems despite being in their 60s and 70s. But the price they pay for that is autoimmunity," she says.

Autoimmunity is when the immune system mistakenly attacks healthy tissues and organs.

In addition, the researchers saw that the immune checkpoint inhibitors that regulate the immune system were not working properly.

# Benefits of immune system aging

"Contrary to what one may think, there are benefits to having an immune system that ages in tandem with the body," says Jörg Goronzy, M.D., Ph.D., a Mayo Clinic researcher on aging, who is a co-lead author of the paper. "We need to consider the price to pay for immune youthfulness. That price can be autoimmune disease."

Immune aging is a sophisticated adaptation mechanism that the immune system can use to prevent autoimmune disease, say the researchers.

They are in the process of developing new diagnostic tests that will help find patients and healthy individuals who carry high numbers of immune stem cells and may be predisposed to autoimmune disease later in life. The research is part of a larger effort at Mayo Clinic called the Precure initiative, focused on developing tools that empower clinicians to predict and intercept biological processes before they evolve into disease or progress into complex, hard-to-treat conditions.

# Plus-sized Southwest Airlines passengers face costly changes

The Dallas Morning News (TNS)

Southwest Airlines is changing its longstanding policy for plussized passengers beginning next year.

Starting Jan. 27, the same day Southwest will begin offering assigned seating on flights, customers who "encroach upon the neighboring seat(s)" should purchase the number of seats they need prior to traveling if they want to secure the seat next to them, the airline said on its website.

However, the airline, which is

LEGAL NOTICE 50-280 (Rev. 4-22/6) headquartered at Dallas Love Field, may not offer those customers a refund, as it has done in the past.

It is the latest sweeping change that has eliminated multiple popular longstanding policies as the carrier looks to generate revenue. Other changes include charging for checked baggage, introducing new fare types and offering assigned seating and premium seating, similar to other major carriers.

When the new policy takes effect, Southwest passengers

who show up at the airport and need an extra seat will be required to purchase one at the rate for that day. If one isn't available, they will be re-booked on another flight.

Plus-sized passengers who purchase fares that do not allow them to select assigned seating should contact Southwest "as soon as possible" after booking so the airline can assist them.

Southwest said it will not assign seats to other members of a passenger's party if the fare does not include that.

# **How many Americans are moving abroad?**

MIAMI — Au revoir, America. The number of Americans moving abroad has risen sharply in recent months, likely due to a number of factors, new data reveals.

An estimated 1,285 U.S. citizens expatriated in the first quarter of 2025, marking a 102% increase compared with the last quarter of 2024, according to a report from CS Global Partners, which analyzed statistics from the U.S. Federal Register.

Should this pattern continue, 2025 is poised to see a recordhigh number of Americans relocating overseas, surpassing the previous peak in 2020 - during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

For those moving abroad, Europe emerged as the top choice, with Greece, in particular, appearing to be the favorite destination, according to the report.

# Texas pulling ahead as national economic growth slows

Job growth, strong consumer

spending, housing affordability and surging business investment are making the South the fastest-growing regional economy in the U.S., according to a new report from Visa.

Economic growth slowed in all

four U.S. regions in the first quarter of 2025 as tariff implementation and uncertainty weighed on businesses and consumers.

Still, the South led the nation in economic expansion and job creation, according to data from the credit card giant.

Service sector hiring across

the region has outpaced expectations, and robust consumer spending in Texas and Florida - two of the country's top domestic migration destinations - is fueling much of the momentum, the report said.

Michael Brown, Visa's principal U.S. economist, said Texas in particular is an anchor for the regional growth story. He pointed to about 270,000 tech workers the state has added since the pandemic.

Visa's economists now forecast the South's gross domestic product to grow by 1.6% and 1.2% year over year in the third and fourth quarters of 2025.


# What is Grandparents Day about?

McQuade left behind a legacy that is continued today by her family in hope that all grandparents and non-grandparents of age are appreciated.

She was born on Jan. 18, 1917, in Caperton, W. Va., and died at 91 on Sept. 26, 2008.
