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WEATHER HISTORY
ON THIS DAY

Oct. 15, 1989 - Hurricane Jerry made landfall at Galveston, TX., at 6:30 p.m. (CDT). Winds at the Galveston Airport reached 75 mph, with gusts to 100 mph. Tides along the island were six to eight feet, and rainfall totals ranged up to slightly more than six inches north of Beaumont. Three persons were killed when their vehicle was blown off the Galveston seawall into the pounding surf.

Oct. 16, 1989 - Heavy snow blanketed the foothills of Colorado. Up to three inches was reported around Denver.

Oct. 17, 1984 - A snowstorm struck northern Utah, producing a record 18 inches in 24 hours at Salt Lake City and 40 inches at the nearby Alta Ski Resort. The storm was responsible for a 50-vehicle pile-up along Interstate 15 near Farmington, UT.

Oct. 19, 1984 - Thunderstorms deluged the town of Odem, TX., (located 15 miles northwest of Corpus Christi) with 25 inches of rain in just three and a half hours. Most businesses in Odem were flooded, as were 1,000 homes in nearby Sinton.

Oct. 21, 1988 - Joan, the last hurricane of the season, neared the coast of Nicaragua, packing 125 mph winds. Joan claimed more than 200 lives as she moved over Central America.

Strange but True

Q. Ticklish question #1: Why is it virtually impossible to tickle yourself? And #2: Is tickling ever a torture?

A. For you to become “tick-lee,” there needs to be a “tick-ler,” a “safe” person and not a stranger, say Tom Stafford and Matt Webb in “Mind Hacks: Tips & Tools for Using Your Brain.” The problem with your self-tickling is that your brain makes an “efference copy” of any motor command, like a carbon copy, so you know it’s your movement.

That’s a “no-go” for tickling. So, here’s the trick: You set up a robotic system where the robot responds and tickles you in one of your ticklish zones. But you’ll need to build in a TIME DELAY that fools your brain into thinking the tickle was externally generated! “This just might do it,” say the authors.

Yet, while the pleasure of tickling is well known, the act can generate pain as well, with the ticklee simultaneously laughing hysterically and writhing in agony. “Indeed, in Roman times continuous tickling of the feet was used as a method of

torture.”

Q. What’s the trick to cutting out background noise while on your cell phone in a loud and crowded place? No, sticking a finger in your other ear won’t do it.

A. Surprisingly, the way to hear better is to cover the mouthpiece. Though you’ll hear just as much noise around you, you’ll be able to hear the caller better, say Sandra Aamodt, PhD, and Sam Wang, PhD, in “Welcome to Your Brain.”

The human brain, it turns out, is a marvel at picking out the voice you want to hear from a host of others - the “cocktail party effect.” But the phone (cell or not) makes this harder by feeding sounds from the room you’re in through the circuitry and mixing them with the signal coming from the other phone.

So now you’ve got the voice plus distorted room noise coming into one ear, plus the room noise coming into the other. This is worse than hearing at a cocktail party, because both the caller’s transmitted voice and the room noise are tinny and mixed together. Covering the mouthpiece can stop the

mixing muddle and recreate the live cocktail party situation. “Try it. It works!”

Q. “What in the thunder was that?” she marvels, not remembering ever hearing thunder in a snowstorm before.

A. Thundersnow, though rare, can happen with sufficient instability and electrical buildup in the storm, bringing on flashes of lightning, says Randy Cerveney in “Freaks of the Storm.” Often this will portend as much as 10 inches of the white stuff, report University of Missouri atmospheric scientists, who analyzed 30 years of data from the U.S. Midwest. Wind and hail are often part of the mix.

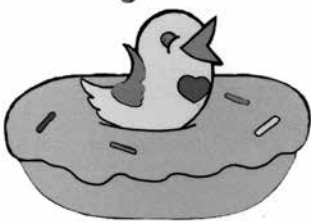
Another weather oddity is St. Elmo’s fire, a small static electricity discharge that can occur with storms, Cerveney adds. A nineteenth-century British surgeon once commented that during a snow shower his horse’s ears became luminous, and the brim of his hat appeared on fire. Minute sparks darted toward the horse’s ears, and “the margin of my hat looked beautiful, and I was sorry to be so soon deprived of it.”

More recently, Arizona meteorologists observed an odd electrical discharge during a rare snowstorm in Tucson. From atop an 80-foot tower, they could see short flashes of light originating at or near the ground all across the city.

“These were less flickering

and intense than normal bolts. There was neither thunder nor radio static. One of the meteorologists speculated that the unusually large wet snowflakes were able to pull electric charges down from the clouds in the fashion raindrops usually do.”

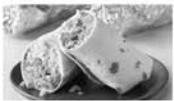
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YA': Two teenage girls robbed a man at an ATM machine in Paris when one of them distracted him in certain questionable ways while the other one swiped his money.

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Study puts Houston next to last on green cities list in the USA

To determine which cities promote a “green” lifestyle, WalletHub compared the 100 largest U.S. cities across 28 key indicators of environmental friendliness and sustainability.

The data set ranges from greenhouse-gas emissions per capita to green job opportunities to number of smart-energy policies and initiatives.

How do other Texas cities rank?

Austin came in at 24 out of 100; Lubbock, 42; El Paso, 45; San Antonio, 51; Laredo, 55; Garland, 62; Irving, 64; Fort Worth, 69; Plano, 77; Corpus Christi, 79; Arlington, 89; and Dallas, 86.

San Jose, CA., is the greenest city in America, in part because it has the fifth-highest number of solar panel installations per capita. Over 47% of the city’s electricity comes from renewable sources, the fifth-highest percentage in the country.

Washington D.C. is the second-greenest city in the U.S., in part because residents often grow their food or buy it locally. D.C. leads the U.S. in the number of Community Supported Agriculture groups (CSAs) and community garden sites per capita. It also has the 12th-most farmers’ markets per capita.

Other top green cities in descending order are: Oakland, CA.; Irvin, CA.; San Francisco, CA.; Honolulu, HI.; San Diego, CA.; Minneapolis, MN.; Portland, OR.; Seattle, WA.; and Fremont, CA.



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My new drone with HD camera awaits its first flight while I read up on how not to crash it

It was a great deal, and I couldn't resist. I bought a drone.

I have never operated one, and still have not. I charged it up and put it back in its case until I could thoroughly read the instruction manual before I sent it for a spin. I wanted to make sure that it came back.

I found out why it was less expensive

than some of the other drones I had looked at. It only has a high definition camera, not 4K - because HD is so "last year" already.

The main difference between HD and 4K is the resolution, with 4K (3840 x 2160 pixels), offering four times the number of pixels as HD (1920 x 1080 pixels). This higher pixel count in 4K provides significantly sharper, more detailed, and clearer images, especially

noticeable on larger screens or when viewing from a closer distance.

I am still watching HD television sets, but plan to upgrade to 4K when they break. I have a 4K monitor that is a huge step up from HD, but when it comes to televisions, it's not that important.

I hardly watch anything but

sports and YouTube, maybe a movie every

now and then. I can see them clearly in HD. There is no rush. It makes no sense to throw away a perfectly good, functioning HD television set.

I grew up watching a color television console that nobody worried about being stolen. Those cathode-ray tube sets weighed a ton.

I thought back then that those TVs had a great color picture, even though when I got close up to it, I could see the

lines across the screen. There were 480 of them. Now there are thousands, and they are so tiny that they blend together to produce a much better picture.

Today's generation is really picky about how realistic their television picture is. My generation went from black and white sets to color, and many of us don't really care all that much. I don't, anyway.

I doubt you can even buy an HD television anymore. It's all 4K, with 8K sets becoming more prevalent. Technology never stops, which is great, but there comes a time when I would like to just pause a little before we jump to the next level.

That's one reason I didn't mind that my drone only has an HD camera. That's just fine with me, considering that I paid about half price for it.

Sharon, The Bulletin's science and technology editor, and I started a YouTube channel a while back, called Wandering with John and Sharon. (I know, the name is kind of lame.) The channel is an offshoot of The Bulletin.

We document our travels (mostly cruising) and have a

great time doing it. I don't have any false hopes that the channel will soon become monetized, but we're trying to increase our presence, so if you visit, please become a subscriber. It's free.

I have been wanting a drone for the channel so we can add aerial shots to the videos we post. I post everything in HD, so the drone's camera is good enough for what we need.

I have to be honest, though. I am a little paranoid about setting it loose in the wild blue yonder.

I am in the process of just about memorizing the entire instruction manual before I turn it on.

I shall overcome, though, and soon we'll be droning all around - wherever.

I'll keep you posted on my progress, dear reader.

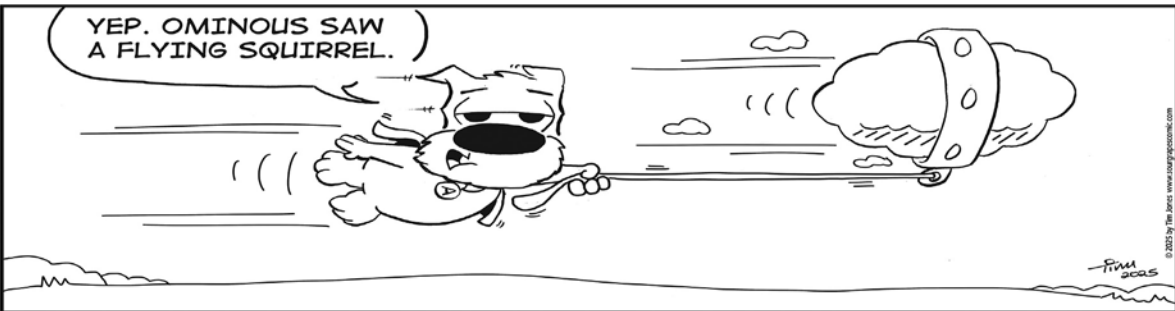

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Tips on how to prepare your garden for autumn

It may not feel like it along the Texas Gulf Coast, but Autumn is here, and your garden needs some attention.

Or is it fall? What's the difference? There isn't any.

"Fall" is predominantly used in American English and "autumn" is preferred in British English.

Either way, here are some tips on how to prepare your garden for autumn or fall.

- Dig up and remove annuals and spent vegetable plants to make space for new growth and prevent disease.

- Pull weeds by the roots to stop them from competing with your plants for nutrients and to prevent them from going to seed.

- Remove fallen leaves, branches, and other plant matter, as this can harbor disease and pests.

- Dig in a fresh layer of compost or manure to replenish nutrients and improve the soil's structure for the next season.

- Install cool-season vegetables and fall crops, and plant spring-blooming bulbs like tulips and daffodils.

- Spread a 4- to 5-inch layer of mulch over beds to insulate roots, retain moisture and suppress weeds.

- Continue to water plants,

especially perennials, once a week if it's dry.

- After use, brush off soil and oil your metal tools to prevent rust and corrosion, ensuring they're in good condition for the

spring.

- Clean gutters, sheds and greenhouses to allow sunlight to reach plants and ensure structures are ready for winter.

Assess your home: Look around your home for potential hazards. Consider enlisting the help of a family member or neighbor who may be more likely to notice things you don't. Install grab bars in your bathrooms, get rid of slippery throw rugs (or add a rubber backing) and keep passageways inside and outside your home well-lit and free from clutter and debris.
